

### An Illustrated Timeline of

### **MILESTONES**

VFW's history spans all 10 decades of the 20th century and well over a decade into the 21st century. During those tumultuous times, it achieved notoriety in many facets of society-veterans service, defense preparedness and community service.

Some of those accomplishments appear on the pages that follow. In significant instances, success was mostly attributable to VFW. In others, goals were attained through alliance with additional groups.




James C. Putnam, first leader of AVFS.



1899 American Veterans of Foreign Service (Columbus, Ohio) is formed by 13 veterans of the Spanish-American War, mostly of the 17th Infantry Regiment.



Four of the original founders in Columbus, Ohio: James Romanis, Oscar Brookins, George Kelly and John Malloy.



Brig. Gen. Irving Hale, a moving force behind the Army of the Philippines.



Three Pennsylvania groups form another AVFS from vets of the Philippines War and Boxer Rebellion (China).

Robert S. Hansbury Philadelphia, 1902

1904 First issue of Foreign Service (November), predecessor of VFW magazine, is published.

1905 AVFS of Ohio and of Pennsylvania amalgamate in Altoona, Pa.





Veterans of Foreign Wars is formally born from merger of the AVFS (Ohio-Pennsylvania) and Army of the Philippines (Denver) at the Pittsburgh Convention in September. Ladies Auxiliary also is formed. General Order 10 had changed the name on Aug. 1 after a Post vote.




Theodore Roosevelt becomes a member. 1917 The ex-President joins in July in Pittsburgh. He is the first of eight U.S. Presidents to eventually join VFW.

1917 War Risk Insurance Act Amendments, advocated by VFW, are its first legislative victory. VFW National Headquarters is established in New York City.

1918 Troop Support-letter-writing campaign and ambulance drive is launched for Doughboys in France. Soldiers serving there are actively recruited into VFW.

> VFW is incorporated on June 14 in Washington, D.C.

VFW National Service Bureau (NSB) is created in Washington, D.C., to serve returning Doughboys of World War I.







1921 **Women WWI nurses** qualify for membership after serving overseas in France.

1921 Tomb of the Unknown Soldier is dedicated.

Military Order of the Cootie is formed.




1922 Buddy Poppy program is launched to assist disabled veterans of WWI.

1924 House Veterans Affairs Committee is the first congressional body created specifically for war vets.



1924 World War Adjusted Compensation Act provides a deferred cash bonus for WWI vets.



1926 Congress officially designates Nov. 11 **Armistice Day.** 



1927 **Aviator Charles** Lindbergh becomes an honorary VFW member during the national convention in Providence, R.I.



1929

VFW recovery of U.S. remains from North Russia marks the organization's entry into the MIA accounting quest.

#### MEMBERSHIP: 465.540 in 1933

1930 Anti-communism rally in Union Square, N.Y.C., is the precursor to Loyalty Day.

**1930** World War Service Disability Pension Act (P.L. 522) is a clear-cut legislative victory for VFW.

**1930 Veterans Administration (VA)** is created after strong advocacy by VFW. VA incorporates the Veterans Bureau.



1930 National Headquarters is established in Kansas City, Mo.



1931 VFW succeeds in its campaign to make the Star-Spangled

Banner the national anthem.

1932 The "Bonus March" in Washington, D.C., though not endorsed by VFW nationally, goes down in history as the first mass demonstration in the nation's capital.



1936 VFW Congressional Charter (P.L. 630) bestows special rights and privileges.



1936 Boy Scout-VFW plan of cooperation makes the relationship (dating back to 1915) official.



**1936 Bonus bonds** issued to WWI vets made immediately redeemable. The bonds' collective worth: \$2.4 billion.

1937 VFW inaugurates a permanent national youth program to offset the ill effects of the Depression on children. It starts with full sponsorship of Junior Softball.



**1938** Armistice Day (Nov. 11) becomes a legal holiday (*P.L. 510*) after a 20-year campaign waged by VFW.





1944 GI Bill of Rights
(P.L. 346) provides
unprecedented benefits
for WWII veterans.
VFW is instrumental in
its passage.

1946 Membership reaches more than 1.5 million in the immediate aftermath of WWII, which boosted the ranks by 728% from 1941.

1949 First Washington
Conference is held
by VFW national and
state officials to lobby
directly on Capitol Hill.
Gen. Omar Bradley
addresses the first
gathering.

Boxing champ **Gene Tunney** becomes national director of VFW Youth Activities.



1942 VFW Aviation Cadet program recruits 65,000 air recruits for the armed forces.





1947 VFW's National Marble Tournament is first held in Boys Town, Neb. A later tournament makes the pages of Life magazine.



1949 VFW celebrates its 50th anniversary with an appearance by President Harry S Truman, a member of Kansas City Post 35.



1950-51 Nationwide community service wins Freedoms Foundation awards.

1950 Life membership is instituted—an innovation to attract and retain new members.

1952 Veterans Readiustment Assistance Act (Korean War GI Bill) passes with a strong push by VFW.

**National Disaster Relief Fund** is established on a permanent basis.

Nov. 11 is designated Veterans Day (P.L. 380) to honor veterans of WWII, Korea and subsequent wars.

Last Commander-in-Chief is elected directly by delegates at the Boston convention.



1951 Foreign Service becomes VFW magazine (January).



1956 150,000 kids take part in the VFW marble competition nationwide, proving to be VFW's most popular sponsored sport.



1958 VFW becomes a full partner in Voice of Democracy (VOD), a scholarship program for college-bound students. VFW assumes primary sponsorship three years later (1961).



1958 **Loyalty Day** is established at the request of VFW as a means to publicly display responsible citizenship and patriotism.



1959 Minnesota VFW/Ladies Auxiliary raises \$325,000 toward dedication of the VFW Cancer Research Center at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis. It's the largest single-Department project ever undertaken.



1960 VFW Washington Memorial Building is dedicated.



1961 Teen-er Baseball leagues total 189 with 14,000 players in 22 states.



1962
Lite-A-Bike program: a
\$300,000 project with
3M Company of St. Paul
provides "Scotchlite"
reflector tape. 50,000
VFW members from
4,500 Posts take part.

1964 VFW/Ladies Auxiliary contributes nearly \$100,000 in disaster relief to earthquake victims in Alaska.



1966 Veterans Readjustment Benefits Act (Vietnam War GI Bill) becomes law.

1968 VFW's Tet Aggression Relief Project raises \$85,000 for South Vietnamese civilians and disabled veterans.

1969 Major support campaign for Vietnam vets and POWs gets under way. VFW circulates a petition recording 2 million signatures that demands humane treatment of POWs.

Senate Veterans Affairs Committee is formed after two decades of VFW's struggle to create it.

**1972-77** Four major pieces of legislation favorable to Vietnam vets are passed with VFW backing.



**1974 VFW's 75th anniversary** is recognized by a commemorative postage stamp.



1977-78 "Save the Panama Canal" campaign becomes "the greatest issue of the day" for VFW, and includes a major rally in Washington.

1977 Sons of VFW includes 16,000 boys.



1978 Women are formally admitted to VFW.

Veterans preference in hiring is preserved.


Veterans Day is returned to Nov. 11.

1979 Vet Centers are authorized to provide emotional stress counseling for Vietnam vets.

VFW Political Action Committee—the first for a veterans group—is created.








1984 Montgomery GI Bill extends education benefits to qualified active-duty personnel.

### 1990s

MEMBERSHIP: 2,167,788 in 1992



Compensation for **Agent Orange** exposure becomes a decade-long crusade.

1981 VFW wins the first-ever case for PTSD disability compensation for a Vietnam veteran.



1982 Vietnam Veterans Memorial
is dedicated. VFW contributes
\$300,000. VFW was the first major
backer of the VVM, and supporter of the
later statue.

1984 Membership passes the 2 million mark.

1985 VFW donates \$122,000 to the Statue of Liberty restoration fund.

1988 Department of Veterans Affairs Act passes, a long-sought VFW goal.



**1989** VA begins operating as a Cabinet-level department with a full secretary.

Court of Veterans Appeals is created.



1991 Heart of America Rally for Persian Gulf War vets in K.C. draws 75,000 spectators. Largest troop-support activity ever sponsored by VFW.

VFW's **Operation Hometown** sends 100,000 care packages to troops in the Persian Gulf.

1991-98 Five major laws to treat and compensate **Persian Gulf War** veterans pass with VFW support.



1993 Vietnam Women's Memorial is dedicated. VFW contributes \$76,000.

1994 VA Golden Age Games sponsorship by VFW begins with \$50,000 per year.

Persian Gulf War Veterans Benefits Act (P.L. 103-446) is signed Nov. 4, covering medical claims, education, employment and housing.

1995 Korean War Memorial is dedicated. VFW donates \$650,000.



1995 Oklahoma City bombing victims receive \$40,000 in VFW donations from Posts nationwide.

Patriot's Pen, an essay writing contest, is created for 7th- and 8thgraders to express their views about democracy.



1996 Veterans Health Care Eligibility Reform
Act provides for a new VA enrollment
system.

VFW's **Operation Uplink** begins. The free phone card program allows hospitalized veterans and deployed troops to call home.

**VFW Foundation** is created to support VFW programs and services.

VFW establishes an **Internet** presence with a website, www.vfw.org, on Feb. 29.

1997 Women in Military Service for America Memorial is dedicated. VFW donates \$118.000.

1998 VFW Posts raise \$100,000 for March of Dimes.

Voice of Democracy gives \$2.6 million in college scholarships and prizes to students in every state.

1999 VFW celebrates its 100th anniversary highlighted by the national convention in Kansas City.



VFW's **Military Assistance Program**is created to provide consistent troop support

The **Kahle Fund** is endowed to offer activities for wounded veterans.

The Smart/Maher National
Citizenship Education Teacher Award
is created to recognize instructors who
promote patriotism and troop support in
the classroom.

## 2000s

MEMBERSHIP: 1,944,151 in 2000

2000 Veterans Millennium Health Care & Benefits Act (P.L. 106-717) signed Nov. 30, 1999, authorizes VA to cover the cost of emergency care for uninsured veterans at non-VA facilities.

Veterans Claims Assistance Act (P.L. 106-475), signed Nov. 9, restores VA's duty to assist veterans applying for VA benefits.



2001 VFW's Benefits Delivery at Discharge outreach network to servicemembers about to be discharged is established on military bases, now totaling 16 offices.

Veterans Survivor Benefits
Improvements Act (P.L. 107-14), signed
June 5, increases financial assistance
for families of military personnel killed in
the line of duty.

Veterans Education & Benefits Expansion Act (P.L. 107-103), signed Dec. 27, increases Montgomery GI Bill payments by 48%.

Presumptive service connection is granted for *Type II diabetes* linked to Agent Orange exposure.

VFW Centennial Plaza, featuring the Citizen-Soldier statue, is dedicated on Oct. 5.





VFW and Ladies Auxiliary sponsor **Unite for Liberty**, an entertainment event held in Jersey City, N.J., to promote patriotism and show support for troops in the wake of 9/11.

Attack on America Fund is created to assist families of active-duty troops killed at the Pentagon on 9/11. A year later, \$120,000 has been distributed.

2002 Presumptive service connection is extended to four more illnesses associated with the **Persian Gulf War** service.



**2003 VFW Charter Act** extends membership to recipients of hostile/imminent danger pay. It also clarifies one of VFW's purposes as charitable.

VFW expands its **Internet** presence with a new web-based relational database.

2004 Servicemembers Civil Relief Act eases financial burdens on activated reservists.

VFW's **Unmet Needs** program is created to financially assist service members or recently discharged vets:

\$4.7 million in emergency grants has been given to military families, most commonly for housing.



National World War II Memorial is dedicated May 29—VFW donates \$6 million.

2005 Emergency Supplemental
Appropriations Act (P.L. 109-13),
announced July 1, increases the death
gratuity for service members killed in a
war zone to \$100,000; the traumatic
disability insurance supplement for
those wounded in action to \$100,000;
and Servicemembers Group Life
Insurance jumps to \$400,000.

VFW donates \$800,000 to families along the Gulf Coast displaced by **Hurricane Katrina.** 

VFW's **The National Defense**, a nationally syndicated military radio talk show is launched.

**Legacy Life Membership** program is established.



2006 National World War I Museum is opened Dec. 2—VFW donates \$350,000 in total—in K.C.

VFW's National Military Services is created, incorporating Operation Uplink (1996), the Military Assistance Program (1999) and Unmet Needs (2004). NMS has hosted more than 420,000 service and family members at deployment and homecoming events.

# 2010s

#### MEMBERSHIP: 1,360,320 in 2013





2008 Post-9/11 Veterans Educational
Assistance Act (P.L. 110-52), signed into law June 26, provides generous education benefits for Iraq and Afghanistan veterans. Such a bill had been fought for by VFW for 10 years before passage.

National Defense Authorization Act (a provision of), signed Jan. 28, extends for 5 years free VA medical care to Afghanistan and Iraq War vets.

2009 Veterans Health Care Budget Reform & Transparency Act (P.L. 111-81), signed into law Oct. 22, guarantees advance appropriations for VA health care accounts.

2010 Caregivers & Veterans Omnibus Health Services Act (P.L. 111-163), enacted May 5, provides assistance to family caregivers along with addressing four other issues.

> Veterans Benefits Act (P.L. 111-275), enacted in October, provides a wideranging package of benefits.

Affordable Care Act includes a provision



ensuring that all VA and Pentagon health care programs are recognized as meeting minimum coverage standards.

2011 Post-9/11 Veterans Educational
Assistance Improvements Act (P.L.
111-377), signed Jan. 4, simplifies the
application process and credits service
of activated reservists.



VFW tornado relief assistance tops \$103,000 for the 2011 season. Included are the tornadoes that ripped through Fort Leonard Wood and Joplin, Mo.

Restoring GI Bill Fairness Act (P.L. 112-26), signed Aug. 3, authorizes greater tuition payments at private schools.

VOW to Hire Heroes Act (P.L. 112-56), signed Nov. 21, expands training and education programs, mandates transition assistance, strengthens re-employment rights for reservists and offers tax credits to businesses that hire vets.

VFW-PAC is dissolved, ending endorsement of electoral candidates. It was created in 1979.

2012 Honoring America's Veterans & Caring for Camp Lejeune Families Act (P.L. 112-154), enacted Aug. 6, includes five other various provisions.

VFW donates \$124,000 to victims of **Hurricane Sandy** in New York and New Jersey.

VFW's **National Council of Administration**, the governing body, is expanded to include representation from all 53 Departments.

#### 2013 VFW and Student Veterans of

America formalize ties on Jan. 3 to further the mutual goals of both organizations.

SVA STANDARD

Improving
Transparency of
Education Opportunities for Veterans
Act (P.L. 112-249), enacted Jan. 10,
protects veterans from unscrupulous,
for-profit schools.

Service tuition assistance programs are reinstated by an amendment to *P.L.* 113-006 signed on March 26.

Stolen Valor Act (P.L. 113-12), signed June 3, restores protection to military awards for valor.

VFW sends \$40,000 in relief to victims of the tornado in Moore, Okla.



Vietnam Education Center (under way)—VFW donates \$650,000.



**National Museum of the Army** (under way)—VFW donates \$500,000.

The American Veterans Disabled for Life Memorial (under way)—VFW donates \$100,000.

VFW-SportClips Scholarship Program. A joint effort with the haircutting chain awards educational grants of up to \$5,000 to qualified vets.

### **VFW Family Tree**

**VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS** traces its origins to veterans of Cuba and the Philippines who formed separate groups in Ohio, Colorado and Pennsylvania. All had similar aims and were founded at, or shortly after, the turn of the century. Because of their common



purposes, they all eventually united to form the premier veterans organization of America.
